Currently, the number of non-oxide materials that have been exfoliated is limited to two fairly small groups, viz. hexagonal, van der Waals bonded structures (e.g. graphene and BN) and layered transition metal chalcogenides. The MAX phases are a well established family of layered ternary transition metal carbides and/or nitrides, with a composition of $M_{n+1}AX_n$, where M is an early transition metal, A is one of A group elements, X is C and/or N; with $n = 1, 2, \text{ or } 3$. The aim of this work is to exfoliate the MAX phases and produce 2D layers of transition metals carbides and/or nitrides by the selective etching of the A layers from the MAX phases. We labeled the resulting 2D $M_{n+1}X_n$ layers "MXenes" to emphasize the loss of the A group element from the MAX phases and the suffix "ene" to emphasize their 2D nature and their similarity to graphene. The etching process was carried out using aqueous hydrofluoric acid at room temperature. Thirteen

different MXenes were produced as a result of this work, viz., Ti₂C, Nb₂C, V₂C, Mo₂C, (Ti_{0.5},Nb_{0.5})₂C, (Ti_{0.5},V_{0.5})₂C, Ti₃C₂, (Ti_{0.5},V_{0.5})₃C₂, (V_{0.5},Cr_{0.5})₃C₂, Ti₃CN, Ta₄C₃, Nb₄C₃ and (Nb_{0.5},V_{0.5})₄C₃. The as-synthesized MXenes were terminated with a mixture of OH, O, and/or F groups. Sonication of MXenes resulted in separating the stacked layers to a small extent. When Ti₃C₂ was intercalated with dimethylsulfoxide, however, followed by sonication in water, large-scale delamination occurred, which resulted in aqueous colloidal solutions that could in turn be fabricated into MXene "paper". MXenes were found to be electrically conductive, hydrophilic and stable in aqueous environments, a rare combination indeed, with huge potential in many applications, from energy storage, to sensors to catalysts. This work focused on the use of MXenes as electrode materials in Li-ion batteries. They exhibited excellent capability to handle high cycling rates with good gravimetric capacities. The lithiation and delithiation were found to be due to redox intercalation/deintercalation reactions.

This study was first prepared as a Ph.D. dissertation for the Department of Near Eastern Studies at the University of Arizona (Hardin 2001) and has since been amplified and embellished by further research. Published here are the results of research deliberately designed by the author to provide for more complete recovery and detailed recording in the field of all artifacts and other remains within a special refined three-dimensional grid matrix. These data in turn established a framework for studying the formation processes active on the materials and for conducting a spatial analysis of the assemblages in the building. Along with developing ethnographic and ethnoarchaeological inferences, these techniques are used to identify activities, activity areas, and social organization related to the building, ultimately defining an "archaeological household" consisting of the pillared dwelling and its occupants. Finally, these conclusions are also related to reconstructions of the Iron II-period household suggested by Hebrew Bible sources.
